

In "Spring" forms freely reach upwards, resembling the treetops of a forest. The eye follows the effortlessly moving shapes, evoking the joyful feeling of growth, of springing up—of Spring itself. The sculpture is 18 feet high and is crafted from high-temperature ceramic (Stoneware with glazes).








APPLE TREES IN BLOSSOM





The patina finish enhances the depth and texture, evoking a sense of timelessness and connection with nature.



TOGETHER THROUGH THE FLAME

"Together Through the Flame" is a profound public sculpture created by Lyubov Muravyeva in 1978. Standing 21 feet tall, the sculpture is crafted from copper sheets with enamel. It features a young girl and a horse running together towards a fiery central structure, symbolizing the grave danger our world faces if people do not start paying attention to their habitat. The

dynamic composition, with its vibrant hues of red, orange, and blue, suggests a flame threatening to engulf the Earth. The moving clouds in the background enhance the sense of motion, inspiring viewers to believe that this obstacle can be overcome through unity between humanity and nature.

The sculpture's curving shape and vibrant blue-green palette create a dynamic composition that brings the song's lyrical imagery to life.


Standing 12 feet tall, it seamlessly blends abstract and figurative elements, inviting viewers to experience the interplay between visual art and musical tradition.

"Save the World from Nuclear Winter" stands as a powerful statement against the threat of nuclear war. Rising 18 feet high, the work depicts three youthful female figures supporting a spherical form, symbolizing Earth.

The slender column base transitions into the graceful forms of the women, their bodies elongated and intertwined as they reach upward. Their collective effort to hold aloft the globe serves as a metaphor for humanity's shared

responsibility in preserving our planet.

Muravyeva's masterful use of ceramics and glazes brings a vibrant, life-affirming palette to the sculpture, contrasting sharply with the somber theme of nuclear winter. The flowing lines and abstract elements infuse the work with a sense of movement and hope.

Placed in an urban setting, this public art piece invites viewers to contemplate their role in safeguarding the world against nuclear threats. Its impressive scale and emotive power make


OCEAN

"Ocean" is a whimsical, large-scale ceramic installation that transforms a kindergarten playground into an underwater fantasy world. Standing 15 feet high and sprawling across 45 by 60 feet, this vibrant sculpture garden invites children to explore and imagine.

The piece features an array of organic forms evoking coral reefs, sea creatures, and ocean waves.

Muravyeva's masterful use of ceramics and glazes brings a tactile, playful quality to each element, encouraging interaction and sparking creativity. "Ocean" exemplifies Muravyeva's talent for creating engaging, child-friendly sculptures that enhance public spaces while nurturing imagination and appreciation for art in its young audience.
